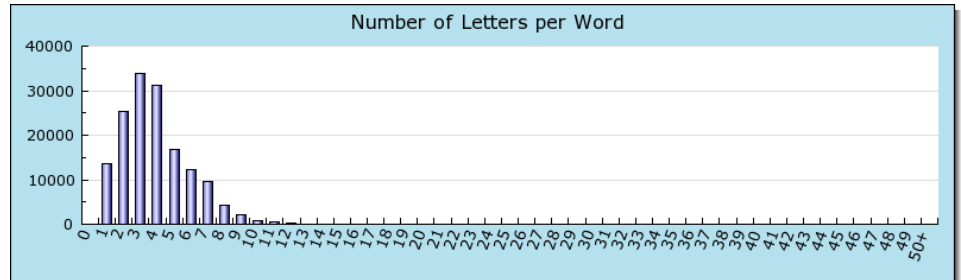
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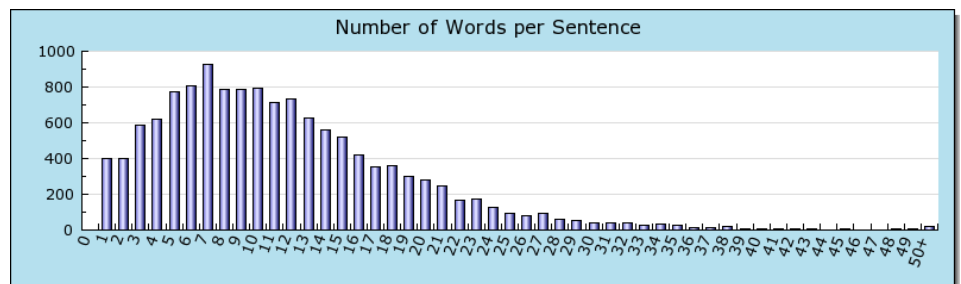
Moving on to the next phase

I made it and with eight days to spare. Final word count, for now, 147,494 words. Feels like I should go and find the extra 506 words to add. It ended up at 135 chapters plus a forward and an acknowledgment, or 1080 words per chapter. The longest chapter is 4,472 words and the shortest is 151.

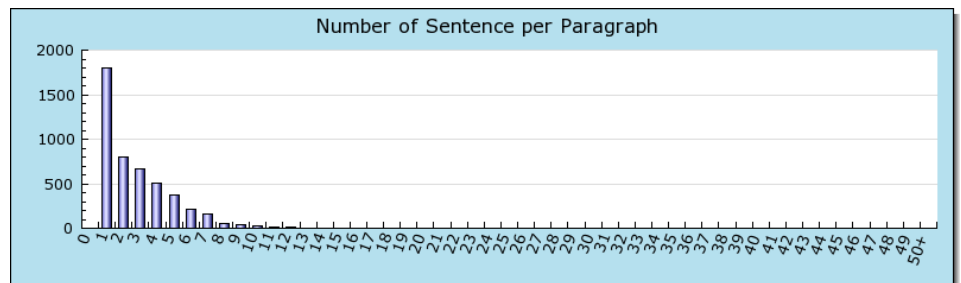

Average letter per word 3.9



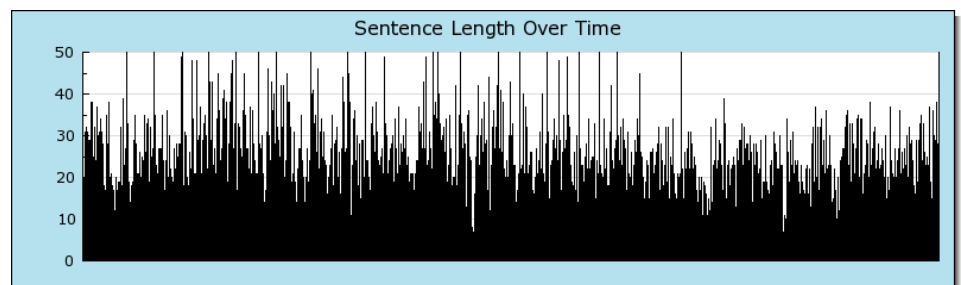
Number of sentences is 13,166

This chart is a little misleading because it is 13,166 lines squishes into 172 lines, so each line represents that maximum for 76 sentences. Still, it shows the variation of length in the story.



I ran my story through the analyzer I wrote – the results are on the right. It shows the variety in my writing. The sentences length is the one that is the most interesting to me. I actually have a measurable number of 50+ word long sentences.

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I also ran my story through a readability checker. It analysis the story using several different rubrics. I think it is interesting that the same story can score as third-grade and seventh-grade.

The text quality measurements were a little more interesting to me; 5% of my sentences have thirty or more syllables. I wonder if that's good?

6% of the words are adverbs. That seems high since Stephen King said, "The road to hell is paved with adverbs." When I thought about that, I also remembered that someone said that exclamation points should be rare. I went and did a search for them. I found that I had 66. I checked to see if all of them were needed. In my review, I removed 14.

Having fun with this, I looked at the number of sentences and how many were "regular", questions and exclamations. I'm a little surprised that the questions are this high.

Next, I looked at "complex" sentences; those with lists, commas, conjunctions and one particular to me, the long dashes which are somewhere in between commas and semicolons.

It was interesting to me that added up they are more of these sentence extending words than there are sentences, which means – since most of my sentences don't have these words – that there are lots of sentences that have several of these. Which makes sense since list often have several elements, so have several commas.

Seeing that so many sentences had commas, I wondered how many were dialog. The 18% didn't surprise me as I like dialog.

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Since my story is all – now – written in first-person, I checked on the common pronouns, plus I.

This one surprised me, and I'm not sure I know what to make of it. The "he" and "she" is partly from the dialog – she said, he said. But the 61% for "I" is hard to accept. I must have sentences with multiple "I's" in them.

The last thing I checked was proper nouns. Again, higher than I would have guessed – especially since I know that some are used singularly in dialog. I guess this means that my story is character focused.
