
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Sixty-Five

So why are they on post-its on the wall? Good question and I have several answers.

- 1) My editor suggested that I date each story so that as the reader goes through the stories they have an idea how far in the future they are. On the far left I have 100 years in the future and on the far right I have 800 years and the post-its will move as I figure out where they go to build a time-line.
- 2) A lot of the stories, especially in the first two chapters, need a rewrite. They lack the passion and personal emotions that the later ones have. The post-its will be a way to keep track of which stories are done.
- 3) By putting the post-its on the wall I can see that some of the chapters are "short" when compared to the others. By having postits I can see both which chapters are short and where the stories within a chapter fall on the timeline. That way, I can add additional stories to round things out.
- 4) At some point I might want to shuffle the stories within a chapter, by having the post-its I can add a sequence number to the chapter number I already have.



- 5) I hoped it would give me motivation. I'm not sure how that's working. The post-its have been there for almost two months and I've sort of sorted the first chapter's stories. None of them are marked as done.
- 6) I have a few "major" events that I have to track. They need to go on the time-line and I have to decide how all the other stories relate to them. As I go back and edit the stories, I can add references to these major events so that the stories feel more placed in time.
- 7) I'm trying to figure out what kind of illustrations I'm going to add to the book. The original idea was to make a history book and so it should look like one, with pictures, graphs and sidebars. I can

start adding different color post-it with the kind of graphic I want. I'll keep track of where I'm getting each graphic and it status in a spread sheet – post-its are only good for so much.

8) And most important of all, sticking post-its on the wall is fun.

Well, there you have it – my life with 75 post-it notes on my wall. Now if I can get rid of one a week that means it will take over a year. One a day would be two months. Maybe I should shoot for three a week and stretch for seven.
